

Sharma, used this saying on a recent Sunday morning, it struck me as both simple and profound. While I have heard it used before in a variety of different settings, I have to admit that I have never really given it a whole lot of thought. That was, until recently.

"It's a marathon, not a sprint." When our Sunday School Coordinator, Anika

The saying recognizes the differences between running a marathon (a long distance race) as opposed to running a sprint (a short race). How one approaches these two types of races is very different. At its core, the phrase highlights the importance of pacing oneself and maintaining consistency over time, as opposed to trying to achieve everything quickly and potentially failing to reach the finish line.

In our Western culture, we like sprints. We like to make decisions and have immediate (or at least quick) results. We don't like having to wait for things. Or perhaps that's just me. I like to have a decision before me, weigh the pros and

cons of the decision at hand, make that decision and see the immediate results of my action. That's possible in some instances, however, too often things take more time.

In church life, it often takes a longer time to see things come to fruition. As people of faith learning to live together and following Jesus, we make decisions and put them into action. However, the results of those decisions and actions take much longer to see than we would like. Living a life of faith is often like running a marathon, not a sprint.

This same Sunday that Anika spoke these words, I invited Jane Grant to come forward and share an experience that she had the past weekend. Jane was invited to a Women's Event put on by our friends at Agape Haven of Abundance. As people were introducing themselves and giving a bit of background, Jane mentioned that she served on staff at LABC for several years. Upon hearing her name, someone nearby spoke up excitedly. You see, this person had a child who was part of the Girl's Group that Jane and others offered many years ago. This woman shared that her daughter was profoundly impacted by Jane's ministry and the Girl's Group those years before, and in fact her daughter went on to college and into a professional career. It was so exciting to hear about the journey this young woman was on that began those many years ago at Girl's Group.

When we engage in ministry opportunities, we don't always see the immediate outcomes that we so often hope for or expect. In this particular case, the story illustrates that ministry is often a marathon, not a sprint. Jane

waited 20 years or more to hear this wonderful story of a ministry impact but it put a smile on her face. There are no doubt others, many of which will never be spoken but nonetheless are profound.

Ministry is a marathon, not a sprint. What is true, however, is that just as a marathon race a participant does not run alone. There are others who make up the mass that runs together. In the case of the church, there are others in our community who move forward together. And no matter how long that race may be (marathon or sprint), God is one of those participants who moves with us by the power of the Holy Spirit. We are never alone.

I encourage each of you to spend some time thinking about that marathon of faith that you have run over all these years, and try to identify some of those places where you see your efforts (alongside God of course) coming to fulfillment and where you're seeing the amazing faithfulness of God moving in this place. And when you see these things, may you give thanks and be reminded that we are together in this race with one another and with God who remains with us in all the races, short and long, in this life we lead as people of faith.

I hope you and everyone at Lake Ave Baptist are doing well!



The Results of the Love & Respond Refugee Outreach Project

It has been an amazing, rewarding and humbling feeling taking the lead on "Love & Discourse to Bourse a part of what I do as Outreach Worker at LABC. Starting from planning, organizing and reaching out to Myanmar churches, multi ethnic Myanmar communities and LABC have been a joy and giving me a great motivation to do what is needed in our society, country and beyond. It's to remind everyone that all we need is LOVE.

Participations from LABC, Myanmar Churches, Karen, Karenni, Kachin, Shan communities have shown once more that when there is a need, we are not hesitant to lend a hand or to help strangers under any circumstances to show LOVE and support, knowing that we were all strangers once to others who had helped us before. Myanmar People who have come to the United States in the last two decades willingly acknowledge the Love & Respond Project as an opportunity to give back to the society as well as to help 250 new refugees who have resettled in Rochester since November, 2024 from around the world. Willingness, understanding & consideration during this difficult time for new comers have brought all of the Myanmar ethnic communities, churches, individuals, and the LABC community together to be a part of this project. It has demonstrated what a true circle of love can be.

The response has been 3-4 times greater than originally imagined. I received monetary donations in the amount of \$ 2391.00 and donated items with an estimated value of \$ 2200.00. The total number of items purchased are valued at \$ 4591.00 and have been given to Catholic Family Center to distribute to the newly settled refugees in Rochester from around the world. Isn't it amazing how God works so generously in our lives when we least expect it? Glory be to GOD.

While working on this project, it brought me back to when I first came to Rochester as a student under LABC's sponsorship. I remembered, I was a stranger to many of you at that time but now we are friends and a family of God at LABC. There must have been many people involved to take on the different tasks to help settle 5 Kachin students in Rochester. Who would have known and thought that I would still be here with you and serving LABC in a missional capacity. I can tell you one thing for sure that because of LABC's mission work, I am who I am today and I do what I do to follow God's will.

It has been an honor to lead this project and I am so blessed to know God has used me as a part of his will.

Lysa Terkeurst said; "The experiences I have affect the perceptions I form. The perceptions I form eventually become the beliefs I carry. The beliefs I carry determine what I see". I see every opportunity as a blessing.




Holden Turner
