This August I had the privilege of serving as the Fall Convocation Preacher at Colgate Rochester Crozer Divinity School. For those of you who have been playing along at home, I just completed my 9 years (3 3-year terms) on the Board of Trustees (including 5 years at Chair of the Board). I have a real affinity for CRCDS. I know that we have a long history with the seminary (and have provided Presidents, faculty, staff, and, of course, students). We currently have three

people associated with LABC as students at CRCDS (Maman, Mark, and Aye Wathy). When I was invited to offer the Convocation sermon I jumped at the opportunity.

A Fall Convocation at a Seminary is essentially the start of the academic year. It is when students return, classes begin, and all other seminary associated activities kick off. It's an exciting time for everyone involved. When I was invited to speak I had to determine the text that I wanted to us. I chose Romans 12:1-2

I appeal to you therefore, brothers and sisters, on the basis of God's mercy, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your reasonable act of worship. ² Do not be conformed to this age, but be transformed by the renewing of the mind, so that you may discern what the will of God— what is good and acceptable and perfect.

The sermon title was "The Big Questions." The premise of my sermon (which is available online if you'd like to listen) is that we (people in general and students in particular) spend a lot of time trying to figure out "what we want to be when we grow up." The question is raised when we're very young (that's when kids often want to be firefighters or police officers or, invariably, marine biologists). Seminary students have the same questions in mind. Do they want to be congregational pastors, chaplains, professors, Christian educators? The list goes on. I suggested that there were two more important questions to consider at the start of the academic years (and at any time for that matter).

First, we need to consider "whose we are." We need to start from the basis that we are God's children, created with value and worth. From there, we need to consider "who we are." This is where we claim our role as people who are called to ministry, in whatever form that may be, who are, as Romans says "transformed by the renewing of our minds." This means making the commitment to live into who we are called to be and growing in our faith, learning, being challenged, and challenging ourselves and others as we discover more and more what it means to follow Jesus.

That's a very short summary, of course. The reason I asked those questions (whose we are and who we are) is because they are the basis for our identity as people of faith. Further, they provide the basis upon which the students will approach their time in seminary. They help to offer a good starting point for our life as a church. It's a good time to reorient ourselves in our ministry together and get back to basics.

As we begin a new church year together I invite you to spend a few moments thinking about these two important questions: whose you are and who you are as a person of faith. It's very easy to start off a new year and jump quickly into the things we do, but underneath that is the important question about identity. Whose are you (God's children), and who are you (a person growing in faith and learning each day to follow Jesus).

Let's spend some time with those questions and may they be things we return to throughout the year. And may your identity in Christ serve as the basis for the things we do as a church and who we are as a church community this year.

From time to time, as needs arise, we may shift the Library into a "Blessing Box" which will contain some canned goods etc. for those in need. We'll let you know if and when we make that shift.

THE LABC COMMUNITY AID FUND

Did you know that LABC has a "Community Aid Fund?" If you've been around LABC for any amount of time, you may remember that on the first Sunday of each month (Communion Sunday) we used to receive a special offering for what was formerly called the "Fellowship Fund." This fund has been renamed to more appropriately reflect how those monies are used ... to offer aid for the community.

You may have heard me say that the ministry of LABC that happens during the week can often look quite different than what we see on Sunday mornings. Quite often the door bell is chiming and the phone is ringing with people who are facing real and significant challenges and they turn to the church for support. The Community Aid Fund provides some money to be used at the Pastor's discretion to help meet some of the needs of those in our community (within the church and beyond).

The challenge that we are facing is that while the needs are great, the funds need to be replenished. In recent years we have simply not made the collection of funds for this purpose a priority. There are some people who have donated here and there, and we absolutely appreciate their contributions. We, however, need to work to make this a more regular practice.

On the first Sunday of each month (Communion Sunday) we will now be encouraging people to make a contribution (large or small), if they are able, to the Community Aid Fund. You are absolutely welcome to make contributions at any time you wish, but we are going to work to help regularize bringing the needs of this ministry to the congregation. You'll start to hear more about it. Please give some thought to whether you can offer some financial support to the Community Aid Fund, and you are encouraged to put it in an enveloped marked "Community Aid Fund" and place it in the offering plate. On behalf of those we help, thank you.

p.s. If you're wondering, we do not ever provide cash assistance. If someone has a bill they need help with, and they are within our zip code (we have to place some parameters around those we help so it doesn't get overwhelming), they bring the bill and we can help pay it that way ...we can't do everything but we try to help when we're able. Thank you again.




And so another moment in LABC's life goes down in history to be celebrated at the next significant anniversary. Well done, good and faithful servants.

Faithful in the Fire: The Role of Prophetic Leadership in Polarized Times. This free webinar with Rev. Dr. Willard Ashley is a workshop centered on the importance of compassionate, courageous, and prophetic voices in a deeply divided society. The Wall, A Visual Timeline

February 13, 2023 – following a police chase, a Cadillac Escalade ended up breaking through the Jones side wall into the sanctuary.

The damage was quite extensive, though we wouldn't realize how extensive for a few weeks.

After removal of the car and the damage, the insurance company was able to come in and do their first assessment of the repairs. It was then we learned about the presence of vermiculate (which requires cleanup like asbestos).

Following the safe abatement, it was time to rebuild ... or so we thought. Turns out that the impact of the car made a much larger section of the wall unstable. Also, there was one steel post that held up part of the roof that was damaged.









In order to deal with the bigger issues, it required opening up a much larger section of the wall


Once the entire wall was opened up, it was time to do more abatement (which of course required stabilizing the upper part of the wall)

Once the wall was deconstructed, it was time to reconstruct.





After the reconstruction came the finishing (inside and out)



What began as a roughly \$20,000 job spiraled into a project that cost insurance just under \$300,000. With abatement, structural work, engineering drawings, new chairs (old ones had to be thrown out because of asbestos abatement) etc. and a whole lot of different sub-contractors, the job is done! Thank you for your incredible patience and to our General Contractors (Hamilton Stern Contractors) for a job well done!!!
